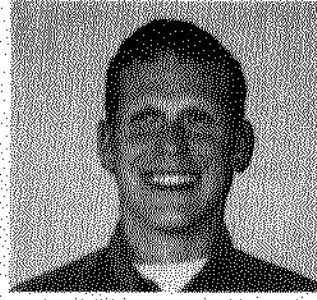

Yes, the NCBA Symposium will be at Pinehurst December 3-6, 2000. Your first question is probably, why move? The first couple of years at Koury were very economical and convenient for our organization. When Koury built the 30 story tower, the Board of Directors knew that there could be competition for meeting space and possible rate increases. So in order to get first bid on the meeting space, we started negotiating our contracts with Koury for the years' 2000-2003. When we received the contract proposals, the Board was in shock. Our meeting space alone rose from \$5,000 to \$21,000. Our room rates were going to increase to approximately \$118. The main reason for this huge increase was the disproportionate number of room nights (hotel rooms reserved) versus meeting space used. The only way we could get the meeting space costs down was to reserve all 1,000 rooms. As a matter of fiscal policy, the Board tries to maintain sufficient funds in the bank to handle any unforeseen expenses associated with a symposium. To meet the increased cost of the Koury proposals would have necessitated another increase in the payment of dues. Rather than subject our members to such an increase, we decided to move.

Where did we look, and why were some sites not selected for consideration? The Board formed a site committee and challenged them with the task of locating alternative symposium sites within North Carolina. There were several areas that did not make the list. Because of the size of our group, the Charlotte Convention Center would only sign a contract one year in advance of the date of our symposium. This would have made it very difficult for the Board to plan and organize a symposium. The Charlotte Merchandise Mart was not recommended because of the lack of hotels in the area and inadequate classroom space. The costs at the Grove Park Inn in Asheville were too prohibitive, and the location was not central to our membership. The Benton convention Center in Winston-Salem did not have enough space for our banquets, and the classrooms were too small for our

needs. The Hilton in Raleigh was likewise too small. Our search even included eastern North Carolina. There were no facilities that could accommodate our vendor space, classroom, banquet, and hotel needs. By this time the Board members had become frustrated and concerned, and began asking themselves the following questions: Should we be more creative with the symposium? Should we merge our symposium with another organization to get our room nights up? Did we really need to have hotel and meeting space in one locale? Should we move the symposium to a different time to get off season rates? Was our vendor area too large? Were we holding too many classes? So with these thoughts in mind, the Board sent the site committee out again to seek additional information on possible locations for a symposium.

The committee contacted the Koury Convention Center to see if we could get an off season rate. We could not, since their business is not seasonal like Myrtle Beach. So the committee contacted the Adam's Mark Hotel in Charlotte. They weren't really interested in our business, basically because our group size would create a disproportionate amount of room nights versus meeting space. The committee continued on their quest to find a new locale. They contacted the Greensboro Coliseum, Sheraton Hotel at RTP in Raleigh, and Pinehurst. All three of these sites were very interested in our business, and they could accommodate our needs. The site committee and Board were relieved to hear this good news! At this time, the Board requested the committee to prepare a comparative analysis of all costs associated with hosting the symposium at each of the sites. This cost would then be compared to the Koury's \$50,000 cost in year 2000. When the costs were totaled, the Sheraton came in at \$38,397, the Greensboro Coliseum at \$43,287, and the Pinehurst at \$37,318. Remember, these are just hotel costs and not the total symposium costs. Both Pinehurst and Sheraton offered free meeting

space, as long as we met the required room nights. The Board rejected the Greensboro Coliseum as an option because we would probably have to pay \$4 to park, and the Board wanted hotel and meeting space to be together. The committee and Board visited both Pinehurst and Sheraton. We discussed time of year, price, growth potential, amenities, transportation, member and vendor issues. So what were the pro's and con's? Please refer to the comparison chart on page five for details.

On September 18, 1998 the Board spent about 5 hours discussing the pro's and con's. It was a very difficult decision. We even listened to comments e-mailed to us from previous Board Members. After hours of detailed discussion, the Board voted 5 to 3 in favor of Pinehurst. The predominate reason for selecting Pinehurst was their ability to accommodate NCBA's growth potential. You might not agree with the Board's decision. I can honestly tell you that not ONE Board member cast their vote without considering the good of the membership, vendors, and association. The division on the vote demonstrates how hard the decision was. We hope you will trust and support our decision in the selection of Pinehurst as the home of our future symposiums.

I would like to thank the Board and site committee for all their hard work. Please join us at the symposium this October in Greensboro! Representatives from Pinehurst will give the membership a sneak preview of their hotel, and answer any questions you may have. Incidentally, the week of our symposium at Pinehurst will be beautiful as the hotel will be decorated for Christmas, and there will be a festive mood. We hope you will bring your families, as Pinehurst will have activities for your wives and children. What better way to kick off the Holiday Season!

NCBA BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The November 6 Board Meeting, held at Duke Medical Center, was called to order by Ray Laxton. Following the review and approval of the minutes of the August 26th and September 18th Board meetings, the business of the Board shifted to the election of Officers of the Board for 1999. Candidates elected were Chris Dissinger, President, Cheryl Spencer, Vice President, Jim Trip, Treasurer, Diane Smith, Membership Secretary, and Sonny Richards, Recording Secretary. **Treasurer's Report:** Randy Meyers indicated the NCBA financial position to be sound, being approximately \$15,000 in the black. This amount did not include \$22,000 in a CD account. **Membership:** Glenn Scales stated that there has been an increase in membership without Symposium attendance. Also indicated was a decline in student attendance. Current membership was stated to be 443.

Nomination Report: Sonny Richards indicated no activity concerning nominations. He recommended Board members to start contacting interested candidates, and present them with the opportunity to learn about the NCBA Board by attending future meetings.

Education: Highlighting the education report was the BMET Certification class to be held April 23-30 at Caldwell Community College, with Certification examination to be held sometime in May. Cost of registration is \$200.00. Chris also indicated his contact with Critikon about training on their new generation monitors. Ray indicated that JCAHO will be presenting a class at the next symposium. Specifics were unavailable as plans had not yet been finalized.

Newsletter: At the beginning of the Board meeting Ray Laxton formally announced that Mike Aycock had resigned from the Board to pursue another career. As Mike was not present, Cheryl Spencer agreed to fill in for Mike on a temporary basis.

Also discussed by the Board was the possibility of holding one unified Symposium sponsored by NCBA and adjoining state organizations. Ray Laxton indicated he would be meeting with representatives from other state organizations to discuss the feasibility of such a joint venture. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Passing Of The Gavel

1998 was a great year for the NCBA! In spite of the presence of hurricane Bonnie, we still saw a great turnout at our annual symposium. Your elected Board of Directors put together a great show. There was a great mix of technical and management classes.

As I stated in my previous letter, the Board had a very important and difficult issue to resolve. It has been said that the NCBA is facing it's own Y2K issue. At a later time, Chris Dissinger will have more to say on that issue.

What does 1999 hold? In addition to planning the annual symposium, your Board is planning some exciting changes to our internet site to make that resource more valuable to our members. They will also be examining the possibility of hosting a regional biomedical symposium in conjunction with our annual symposium. In addition to these changes, we will be sponsoring an all day class with the JCAHO. As you can see, your elected members will be working hard in the coming year.

On December 8, 1998, I participated in a 2 hour telephone seminar on Y2K presented by AHRMM. Faculty Conference members were:

Relative to the process that we should all be following to one extent or another, there was little information that I had not already heard. What was of greatest interest to me however, was information relative to Contingency Planning. The first requirement for all facilities, healthcare or otherwise, is the development of a Y2K Plan. Contingency planning simply needs to be a part of the general Y2K plan. Essential contingency planning should:

- Define the mission, and plan to accomplish.
- Stress importance of maintaining strong relationships with suppliers.
- Include alternative listing of suppliers for backup support, i.e. rental equipment.
- Identify all critical systems and potential hazards associated with each. Classify by risk.
- Assign responsibilities in accordance with Contingency Plan.
- Recommend development of a "Help and Operations Manual" or other means of communication to assist hospital staff.
- Ensure that all individuals with a need to know are informed of the Contingency Plan and its provisions.
- Address Disaster Recovery.

It was also suggested that at the earliest possible time, a post millennium assessment should be conducted. In conjunction with the post assessment, the need for accurate and concise documentation was stressed repeatedly.

One of the final comments made by Mr. Lewis was that "we are at risk because of our dependent relationships. It makes little difference if we are fully compliant, if the institutions that support us are not." I think this goes without saying. By now we should all recognize the risks associated with the Y2K Phenomenon.

For those who may be interested, ECRI will be hosting a series of Y2K telephone seminars. Six seminars in all are scheduled between the months of February and November, 1999. 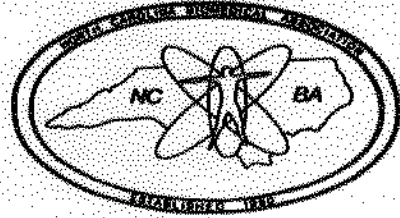
