dam Broussard's pet project, The BMET Shop (http://www.flash.net/-addman/bmet or www.flash.net/-addman/bmet), is a web site that deserves to be on every BMET's bookmark list. Although the site was created in 1997, I only recently discovered it via a reference in the November/December, 1998, issue of Journal of Clinical Engineering. An inveterate web surfer, I am always looking for sites to make my job easier. Not only does Broussard's site fill the bill, it also offers a little humor for what can sometimes be a dry business.

The icons offered are Biomed Links, Internet Links, Articles and Opinions, Biomed News, News Groups, and Jokes and Stories. The home page states, "We are now boasting one of the largest Biomedical Link sources on the net ... (with) 500+ links to OEM'S, government, organizations, and more." The links include parts suppliers, medical reference, publications, standards, chat lines, and job listings. The North Carolina Biomedical Association's link is featured. Broussard invites users to add their own links, so with time, the site may well become The Largest Biomedical Link.

The Internet Links offer over 40 sites under the headings Internet Searches, Useful Internet Tools, Graphics, Shareware, and Other Goodies. Broussard has amassed such a collection of link sites that it makes you wonder when he had time to develop his career to the BMET II status (his resume is also available at this site!).

Articles and Opinions, Biomed News, and News Groups are important sources of current information in our field. Topics such as EMI, Y2K, and polices and procedures are presented, along with updates on clinical procedures and OEM news. The Temple University link is particularly useful with Tech Tips and colorful Reference Charts and Diagrams. Broussard utilizes many resources such as magazines, vendor news releases, FDA, JCAHO and other regulatory agencies and medical association reports. It's nice to know that someone else takes all that time to read (and read, and read, and read) and summarize this information so I can pick and choose what pertains to me.

The Jokes and Stories section will have others in your shop wondering what you are giggling about. ## **JCAHO AND Y2K**

he following information on what to expect from JCAHO Surveyors relative to Y2K is provided for those of you who may be facing a JCAHO Survey prior to the Year 2000. This information appeared in the March /April 1999 issue of the "Environment of Care Leader."

Surveys will check for Y2K awareness and preparation. Poor Y2K planning can mean type 1 recommendations.

Because of the possibility of technical, mechanical, and utility problems that may accompany the year 2000 (Y2K), it is imperative that all health care organizations develop backup processes and procedures to protect their patients, staff, and facilities. Joint commission surveyors have recently been instructed to look for awareness of and preparation for Y2K.

Standards where Y2K concerns regarding awareness and planning could be scored include those in the LD, IM, and EC chapters.

Surveyors cannot and will not evaluate the specific adequacy of an organization's compliance with Y2K issues, but an organization's planning for Y2K compliance will be discussed during 1999 routine biennial or triennial surveys, as well as random unannounced, for-cause, and other types of

surveys.

Organizations should identify and assess the implications of Y2K on operations, including computer systems, medical equipment, and utility systems, and determine whether organizations that provide supplies or services are addressing the Y2K issue.

If an organization's planning with respect to Y2K is minimal or nonexistent, the organization will receive type I recommendations.

Here's a look at how surveyors will assess your Y2K plans.

During the leadership interview, hospital leaders will need to explain potential problems and how they are addressed, say JCAHO officials. Here are a few things to consider:

- Be sure Y2K is a team effort.
   Staff should be empowered to work on critical issues.
- Be prepared to show documentation that confirms you have addressed medical equipment and utilities.


Consider crowd control. In the event of a city-wide power failure, your hospital might be the only warm place to go. Surveyors might want to see your plan.

#### The Virginia Biomedical Association

A Brief History (From the VBA Website)

or years many BMETs in Virginia had discussed a statewide Biomedical Association. Although there were several independent regional organizations in Virginia, a statewide organization was not established until 1994.

For the better part of 1993, Mary Frye Coker, Steve Haupt and Ryland Paxton performed the exhaustive research and background work needed to get started. On February 5th, 1994, an organizational meeting was held at the Wintergreen Resort, with the idea that a recreational setting would help create a more informal and interactive atmosphere. With encouragement and guidance from the North Carolina Biomedical Association and then NCBA President Greg Johnson, this meeting was a huge success and can be considered the beginning of the Virginia Biomedical Association.

In the following months, several key members got down to the business of putting together a working organization. Mary Frye Coker organized the first Annual Meeting, Mark Freeman began the newsletter, Frank Insley persuaded then Virginia Governor Allen to establish a "Biomedical Technicians Week "and Lis Carroll organized our first technical training class - four days on Hewlett-Packard Monitors. Numerous other people and companies also contributed their times and resources to the VBA, ensuring our success.

Finally after more than a year in planning, in August 1994, we had our first Annual Meeting with election of the Board of Directors and ratification of the bylaws. We also held a vendors symposium and training classes to round things out. We were on our way.

That first organizational meeting has evolved into an annual "Winter Meeting" which is made up of informal classes and discussion groups in a semi-retreat type of atmosphere. The "Annual Meeting", which is where the real VBA business gets done, provides a lively interaction between members, is fast paced and has been growing in

programs, attendance and vendor sponsorship each year.

1997 was a significant year for the VBA. At this time most of the founding members have rotated off the Board of Directors. After much debate, this is also the first time that the officers were elected outside the Board. This "changing of the guard" is representative of a healthy, growing organization and shows the willingness of the VBA members to step up and provide leadership.

In 1999, the future has never seemed brighter for the VBA. In addition to a new Board of Directors, we have been able to update our website, www.vabiomed.org, plan and sponsor another successful Winter Retreat and we're in the planning stage of what we believe will be the best Annual Meeting this fall in Williamsburg.

Take time to visit of our website and learn more about the VBA, our officers and future opportunities for your professional advancement.


